
We realize giving up a Saturday just to hear someone talk is a great sacrifice. So we thank you.

He went to books for knowledge. He went to books for entertainment. He went to books for growth. He went to books for information.



The Keystone XL Pipeline is a proposed 1,179 mile (1,897 km), 36-inch-diameter crude oil pipeline which begins in Hardisty, Alta., and travels south through to Steele City, Neb. This pipeline goes through many different states and provinces on its route south, including: Alberta and Saskatchewan in Canada, and then Montana, South Dakota and Nebraska in the United States. Along with transporting crude oil from Canada, the Keystone XL Pipeline will transport oil from producers in Texas, Oklahoma, Montana and North Dakota.

In January, 2013, <u>Governor Dave Heineman approved an alternative route (PDF, 620 KB)</u>, for the Keystone XL Pipeline in Nebraska. The new route was created to minimize disturbance of land, water resources and special areas in the state.

Keystone Leak Worse Than Thought

The rupture, which went undetected by pipeline owner TransCanada, has spilled roughly 17,000 gallons of oil in South Dakota.By Alan Neuhauser | Staff Writer April 8, 2016, at 9:50 a.m.

A leak in the Keystone pipeline is worse than first believed, spilling much more oil than first reported. Nearly 17,000 gallons of oil has leaked in South Dakota since Saturday, pipeline owner TransCanada says – up from the 187 gallons the company <u>initially reported to federal authorities</u>.

TransCanada has "yet to pinpoint the source," the company told CNN Money, but it maintains the leak has been "controlled," and a section of the pipeline was shut down after the spill was discovered

The leak was not reported by the Keystone pipeline's <u>spill detection system</u>, but instead was discovered by a passerby, <u>according</u> to Chris Nelson, chairman of the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission.

Keystone, which runs about 2,150 miles from tar sands in Alberta, Canada, to refineries in the U.S. Midwest, is less than a decade old. After being commissioned in 2010, it <u>reportedly recorded</u> 35 leaks in its first year alone, including a spill of 21,000 gallons of oil in North Dakota.

Nonetheless, TransCanada maintained that a planned \$5.4 billion addition to the pipeline network, <u>Keystone</u> <u>XL</u>, would "set the gold standard for a safe and reliable 21st century pipeline," as it described in a statement in

January 2015.

<u>President Barack Obama rejected the Keystone XL project in November</u>, citing concerns about climate change. The company is now seeking to build the Energy East pipeline, a 2,800-mile project which would carry 1.1 million barrels of crude per day to refineries in eastern Canada. The company also <u>sued the Obama administration in January</u>, arguing it overstepped its constitutional authority in blocking Keystone XL.

Keystone I Leak Raises More Doubts About Pipeline Safety

A leak and shutdown in South Dakota comes as TransCanada seeks to build another large, cross-country pipeline touting its leak detection technology.

<u>Update</u>: On Thursday, April 7, TransCanada said it had found an estimated 16,800 gallons of oil in the Keystone I pipeline right of way. That figure is 90 times higher than the company's original estimate of 187 gallons. Company spokesperson Mark Cooper said in a written statement that the oil came from a "small leak" in the pipeline. The line has been shut down since Saturday. An oil spill that surfaced in South Dakota over the weekend prompted Canadian pipeline company TransCanada to shut down its Keystone I pipeline, a predecessor to the controversial Keystone XL project.

TransCanada had still not confirmed the leak as of Tuesday, calling it a "potential incident." According to Chris Nelson, chairman of the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission, the leak was first reported by a passerby. TransCanada reported to the U.S. Coast Guard on Saturday that 187 gallons of oil had leaked, Nelson said. The line is expected to remain closed all week.

The leak is the most recent of dozens reported since the pipeline, which moves about 500,000 gallons of oil per day from the tar sands of Alberta to refineries in the U.S., was commissioned in 2010.

According to Nelson, the leak was not revealed by the company's own leak detection systems. Environmentalists familiar with pipeline leaks said the equipment's failure to detect it is cause for concern.

"It's another piece of evidence in the inherent risk of some of these systems and our oil transportation infrastructure," said Anthony Swift, the Canada program director for the Natural Resources Defense Council. "Contrary to industry talking points, the reality is pipeline systems do fail."

Keystone I was commissioned in 2010 with a number of advanced leak detection technologies. In its first year, the pipeline leaked 35 times in the <u>U.S.</u> and <u>Canada</u>. Most were minor leaks; one was major spilling more than 21,000 gallons of oil in North Dakota.

This leak comes as TransCanada seeks to build the Energy East Pipeline, which would carry 1.1 million barrels of crude oil per day 2,800 miles from Alberta and Saskatchewan to refineries in eastern Canada.

"Just last month hearings began in the province of Quebec on TransCanada's proposed Energy East Pipeline and TransCanada was making a lot of very big claims about how in near minutes they would detect any leak and be able to shut down the pipeline in event of a spill," said Keith Stewart, who leads the energy campaign for Greenpeace Canada.

<u>TransCanada states on its website that its Energy East Pipeline would employ leak detection technology that</u> <u>"can detect events immediately"</u> allowing "the line to be shut down and valves surrounding the area to be closed within minutes, limiting the impact of a potential spill."

"Given that the Keystone Pipeline is less than a decade old it doesn't give us a lot of confidence in their claims of how good the technology is to detect spills and thus minimize them," Stewart said.

An investigation of 10 years of federal leak data by InsideClimate News in 2012 found leak detection systems used by pipeline companies detected only 5 percent of pipeline spills in the U.S.

Leak detection experts said the current leak is likely too small to easily detect.

"I know the public would love to have a leak detection system that is 100 percent reliable but it's an extremely difficult challenge," said Richard Kuprewicz, president of Accufacts, Inc., a consulting firm that provides expertise on pipelines to government agencies and industry. Kuprewicz has worked with TransCanada in the past, but is not currently.

Kuprewicz said companies typically rely on a combination of sensors inside pipelines that measure temperature, pressure, flow rates and other hydraulic data as well as external sensors that can detect fluid outside the pipeline. Internal sensors are unlikely to detect small leaks and external sensors are prohibitively expensive to use everywhere along a pipeline's path, Kuprewicz said.

The spill was most likely tar sands crude, also known as diluted bitumen, Swift said.

28 while California had the most - 3,164, according to this report.


The method used to determine how many lives were lost was based on a model developed by the Institute of Medicine in 2002 for their report "Care without Coverage: Too Little, Too Late." In that report, the IOM found 18,000 adults between 25 and 64 died in 2000 because they didn't have health insurance. Pollack says if the Affordable Health Care Act stays intact and goes into effect fully in 2014, millions of American will be eligible for help covering costs and insurance companies will no longer be able to deny coverage to those with pre-existing conditions or charge them higher premiums. **Pres. 6. Stronger Analytical Thinking Skills

Have you ever read an amazing mystery novel, and solved the mystery yourself before finishing the book? If so, you were able to put critical and analytical thinking to work by taking note of all the details provided and sorting them out to determine "whodunnit".

That same ability to analyze details also comes in handy when it comes to critiquing the plot; determining whether it was a well-written piece, if the characters were properly developed, if the storyline ran smoothly, etc. Should you ever have an opportunity to discuss the book with others, you'll be able to state your opinions clearly, as you've taken the time to really consider all the aspects involved.

7. Improved Focus and Concentration

In our internet-crazed world, attention is drawn in a million different directions at once as we multi-task through every day. In a single 5-minute span, the average person will divide their time between working on a task, checking email, chatting with a couple of people (via gchat, skype, etc.), keeping an eye on twitter, monitoring their smartphone, and interacting with co-workers. This type of ADD-like behaviour causes stress levels to rise, and <u>lowers our productivity</u>.

When you read a book, all of your attention is focused on the story—the rest of the world just falls away, and you can immerse yourself in every fine detail you're absorbing. Try reading for 15-20 minutes before work (i.e. on your morning commute, if you take public transit), and you'll be surprised at how much more focused you are once you get to the office.

8. Better Writing Skills

This goes hand-in-hand with the expansion of your vocabulary: exposure to published, well-written work has a noted effect on one's own writing, as observing the cadence, fluidity, and writing styles of other authors will invariably influence your own work. In the same way that musicians influence one another, and painters use techniques established by previous masters, so do writers learn how to craft prose by reading the works of others.

9. Tranquility

In addition to the relaxation that accompanies reading a good book, it's possible that the subject you read about can bring about immense inner peace and tranquility. Reading <u>spiritual texts</u> can lower blood pressure and bring about an immense sense of calm, while <u>reading self-help books</u> has been shown to help people suffering from certain <u>mood disorders</u> and mild mental illnesses.

10. Free Entertainment

Though many of us like to buy books so we can annotate them and dog-ear pages for future reference, they can be quite pricey. For low-budget entertainment, you can visit your <u>local library</u> and

bask in the glory of the countless tomes available there for free. Libraries have books on every subject imaginable, and since they rotate their stock and constantly get new books, you'll never run out of reading materials.

If you happen to live in an area that doesn't have a local library, or if you're mobility-impaired and can't get to one easily, most libraries have their books available in PDF or ePub format so you can read them on your e-reader, iPad, or your computer screen. There are also <u>many sources online</u> where you can download <u>free e-books</u>, so go hunting for something new to read!

Because when you live other lives through books, you begin to see the other lives happening in the world around you. The lives you know nothing about.

And you begin to have a little more understanding. A little more interest. A little less "us versus them" and a lot more "we're all in this together."

6. You will be a nicer person.

You might not care about being a nicer person, but the other people in your life probably do care.

Reading, as my friend Christine put it, "allows me to experience another's emotions, which in turn makes me more sensitive to those around me."

And she's right.

Maybe you've never been a victim of racism, abuse, or poverty. Maybe you don't know what unrequited love feels like. Maybe you find it easier to criticize than to sympathize.

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7. You will learn stuff.

Even if all you read is fiction, you can learn quite a lot about cultural influence, relationships, history, fear, human psychology, the various expressions of spirituality, the effects of war, the way robots will definitely take over the world, and how superheroes manage to keep their capes clean.

All very useful information.

Want more? Branch out into non-fiction. Biographies, history, current events. No, just kidding; skip the books on current events. Read history instead; you'll learn more about current events that way.

Philosophy. Psychology. How-to books. Memoirs. Science. Exploration. If you're interested in it, you can find a book about it. Probably you can find an entire section of books about it.

And hey, if you can't find a book about it, maybe you should write one.

8. You will discover that you were dumber than you knew.

In the time prior to your avid reading addiction (also known as "The Years Which Must Not Be Named"), you thought you had a pretty open mind, didn't you?

Go ahead, you can admit it. I won't laugh.

You thought that you knew kind of a lot, and that you had a broad perspective on life, and a pretty accurate view on the world and how things worked.

And then you started reading.

Maybe the first few books weren't such a big deal. They probably kept you safely in your comfort zone. But then one of the members of your new reading family gave you a recommendation.

"You've got to read this," she said. "It's so great. Really." So you did.

And you realized that something you thought you knew—really knew, truly and certainly—was not right at all. You felt the edges along your mind begin to crack open a little bit.

You felt a little light seeping in and you started seeing the interior of your mind the way it really was: dim, dusty, and crowded with a lot of assumptions.

You kept reading, and the more you read, the more those cracks opened up. One by one, those assumptions slipped and slid out of the cracks. The light grew. The air cleared.

You started populating your mind with different things: images, conversations, perceptions, insights, data. Poetry. Fragments of lives you didn't live, but somehow experienced through a book. Emotions that didn't belong to you, but that you felt just as strongly.

Real things, from the real world, instead of that crumbly old stack of assumptions and expectations.

9. You will be more creative.

As you fill your mind with fresh material from all these books, something wonderful starts happening.

Your mind wakes up.

Creativity is really all about making connections. The creative people in life, the ones we admire for their ingenuity, are the ones who can make those connections really well. They have a broad database of knowledge, and they don't bother keeping the categories separate. They let poetry seep into science. They let faith and history hang out together.

They understand, in fact, that all those categorizations are imposed. We put labels on things so that we can feel like we understand them, but sometimes the labels are counterproductive. Reading helps you tear the labels off.

Reading helps you to fill your mind from as many sources as you want, and then let all of that beautiful stuff mingle and mix in anyway it wants.

10. You will become more imaginative and less afraid of being weird.

When you read books that are the product of someone else's imagination, you start to trust your own imagination, and use it.

What a great idea! Using that brain, in all of its crazy, unnerving, glorious potentiality.

Reading will help you do that. If you feel like your mind is strange, start reading. After a few runs through the world of surrealism or science fiction (or surrealistic science fiction), you will feel like the most normal person in the world. Who are these crazy people who come up with these weird, fantastical ideas?

Of course, you'll want to read more. So you will. And then your own imagination will start to blend what you've read with the real life you're living, and you'll add in your own unique collection of information, experience, education, and personality. Who knows what will result?

Don't you want to find out? Why don't you have a book open yet?

What does Obama read?

The *The Post-American World* was written by <u>Fareed Zakaria</u>, an Indian-born political journalist (commonly described as a "political moderate") who specializes in world affairs and has <u>written</u> for (and edited) U.S. national news publications, <u>hosted</u> U.S. television news programs, and <u>authored</u> several books on international issues. A *Village Voice* profile described Zakaria (a naturalized citizen of the United States) thusly:

Although he was a rising star in the serious foreign-policy world of the '90s (*The Nation* once described him as a "junior Kissinger"), it was his post-9/11 *Newsweek* cover story "Why They Hate Us" that put him on the mainstream map as someone who could make sense of the now threatening outside world. And he has continued to win himself a substantial following with his thoughtful critiques of the Bush administration's activities in Iraq. He is America's go-to man for global chaos, providing some urgently needed outside perspective on our never ending war on terror.

His own upbringing was open-minded and secular; he sang Christian hymns at school and celebrated Hindu as well as his own Muslim holidays. "I do know a lot about the world of Islam in an instinctive way that you can't get through book learning," he says thoughtfully, but admits he finds the role of token Muslim explainer in the American media slightly uncomfortable. "I occasionally find myself reluctant to be pulled into a world that's not mine, in the sense that I'm not a religious guy."

The following review (from *Publishers Weekly*) summarizes the thesis of *The Post-American World*:

When a book proclaims that **it is not about the decline of America** but the rise of everyone else, readers might expect another diatribe about our dismal post-9/11 world. They are in for a pleasant surprise as Newsweek editor and popular pundit Zakaria (*The Future of Freedom*) delivers **a stimulating, largely optimistic forecast of where the 21st century is heading**. We are living in a peaceful era, he maintains; world violence peaked around 1990 and has plummeted to a record low. Burgeoning prosperity has spread to the developing world, raising standards of living in Brazil, India, China and Indonesia. Twenty years ago China discarded Soviet economics but not its politics, leading to a wildly effective, top-down, scorched-earth boom. Its political antithesis, India, also prospers while remaining a chaotic, inefficient democracy, as Indian elected officials are (generally) loathe to use the brutally efficient tactics that are the staple of Chinese governance. Paradoxically, India's greatest asset is its relative stability in the region; its officials take an unruly population for granted, while dissent produces paranoia in Chinese leaders. **Zakaria predicts that despite its record of recent blunders at home and abroad, America will stay strong, buoyed by a stellar educational system** and the influx of young immigrants, who give the U.S. a more youthful demographic than Europe and much of Asia whose workers support an increasing population of unproductive elderly. A

lucid, thought-provoking appraisal of world affairs, this book will engage readers on both sides of the political spectrum.

As for what the chief executive reads in his spare time, according to deputy press secretary Bill Burton, President Obama brought the following books with him to his August 2009 vacation at Martha's Vineyard:

- The Way Home by George Pelecanos, a crime thriller based in Washington, D.C.
- Lush Life by Richard Price, a story of race and class set in New York's Lower East Side.
- Hot, Flat, and Crowded by Tom Friedman, on the benefits to America of an environmental revolution.
- John Adams by David McCullough, a biography of the Founding Father and 2nd U.S. President.
- Plainsong by Kent Haruf, a drama about the life of eight different characters living in a Colorado prairie community.

In 2015, President Obama's summer reading list, as announced by the White House, included the following books:

- All That Is, a novel by James Salter, whose "intimately detailed novels and short stories kept a small but devoted audience in his thrall for more than half a century."
- All The Light We Cannot See, by Anthony Doerr, the story of a blind French girl and a reluctant German soldier whose lives converge in the French coastal town of Saint Malo.
- The Sixth Extinction, by Elizabeth Kolbert, a work that explores the harmful impact of humans on the planet.
- The Lowland, by Jhumpa Lahiri, which tells the story of two brothers in Calcutta India in the 1960s who share everything but begin to pull apart as they grow older.
- Between the World and Me, by Ta-Nehisi Coates, a meditation of race in America in the form of a letter from the author to his adolescent son.
- Washington: A Life, by Ron Chernow, the historian who penned the biography of Alexander Hamilton that the musical "Hamilton" is based on.

Obama summer reading list leans toward fiction

President Barack Obama, perhaps seeking a break from harsh reality after a tough summer battling the economy and Republicans in Congress, has picked a summer reading list that is long on fiction.

The White House says four of the five books that Democrat Obama has to choose from during a nine-day family vacation here are novels.

Obama's reading list -- like the criticism from Republicans for vacationing while the economy is stumbling -- is a rite of the summer.

But his choices ignored the weighty biographies of great Americans typically on a president's reading list.

Obama picked up two of the books on an outing with daughters Sasha and Malia on Friday: "The Bayou Trilogy," a mystery collection by Daniel Woodrell set in Louisiana, and "Rodin's Debutante," a novel by Ward Just with a character who becomes politically conscious after moving to a rough neighborhood on Chicago's south side, echoing Obama's time there as a community organizer before he entered politics.

The president also bought along books: "Cutting for Stone," a novel by Abraham Verghese that traces the lives of two boys who are born joined at the skull in Ethiopia, and "To the End of the Land," a novel by David Grossman of a mother who tries to keep her son alive while he is at war by hiking the length of Israel, hoping that if she cannot be reached to be told of his death, he won't die.

He also brought "The Warmth of Other Suns," by Isabel Wilkerson, the only non-fiction work on the list, which describes America's migration of blacks from the South.

Republican critics have slammed Obama for vacationing for the third consecutive summer on Martha's Vineyard, an upscale island off the Massachusetts coast which was also favored by Democratic presidents John Kennedy and Bill Clinton.

They say vacationing at the scenic island, a stomping ground for movie stars and other wealthy Democratic Party backers in August, shows Obama is out of touch while 14 million Americans are out of work and unemployment is pinned above 9 percent.

The White House says the country does not begrudge Obama some time with his family, but it has been careful to allow no pictures so far of him at play on the golf course.

Obama's winter vacation reading list: Heavy on the dark fiction

HONOLULU -- President Obama is spending his winter vacation in sunny Hawaii. His reading list while he's there skews a bit darker.

Four books, three of them novels, have made the presidential reading list just before 2015 becomes history. They include The Whites, by Richard Price; Purity, by Jonathan Franzen (<u>purchased</u> a few weeks ago at D.C.'s Upshur Street Books); The Three Body Problem, by Liu Cixin and The Wright Brothers, by David McCullough.

Franzen is a long-time favorite of the president — his book "Freedom" made Obama's summer 2010 list during the First Family's vacation in Martha's Vineyard that year. And for a fan of "The Wire," it's not surprising that Obama selected noir writer Price's most recent work.

The Three Body Problem is a translation from the original Chinese science fiction novel that has won critical acclaim in the United States. Since it focuses on a young astrophysicist who suffers during the Chinese Revolution, it seems unlikely that this particular reading recommendation came up during Obama's discussions with President Xi Jinping during this fall's state visit. But it could make for an interesting conversation starter during Obama's visit to China next fall.

WASHINGTON — President Obama unveiled new reading programs and plugged the value of the desire to learn Thursday during a "virtual field trip" for middle school students.

"The most powerful engine for learning is between your ears," Obama told students gathered at the Anacostia Library in southeast Washington.

Taking questions from audience members and from other middle school students following online, Obama said at one point that books, computers, and other can technology can only take people so far.

They have to retain "a passion for learning," he said during the event facilitated by Discovery Education.

Speaking in front of packed book shelves, Obama announced a commitment by major publishers to make more than \$250 million in free eBooks available to low-income students.

The president also announce the "ConnectED Library Challenge," a commitment by more than 30 communities to supply library cards to all students. It's part of Obama's project to have provide Internet access to all the nation's classrooms.

Obama spoke about his favorite books growing up — a list that ranged from Hardy Boys mysteries to *The Lord of The Rings* to *The Great Gatsby* — and his own writing career as the author of three books.

The president also took a question about how to overcome to occasional writer's block.

"There's only one way to overcome writer's block," he said: "To just write something ... It's not as intimidating as if the page is just blank."

After a while, the student moderator cut him off by saying, "I think you've sort of covered everything about that question."

At one point, Obama noted that his presidency will end in less than two years, and that he planned to do some kind of community work during his post-White House years.

"That's the kind of work that I really love to do," Obama said.
